

2024 NSW funding for non-government schools

The NSW Government has implemented the 'Gonski' needs-based, sector-blind funding model to all NSW schools, including non-government schools. The Government will fund all non-government schools consistently to ensure they have the resources they need.

NSW funding arrangements for non-government schools

Consistent with the changes introduced in 2019, NSW is continuing the transition to fund non-government schools at 20% of their Schooling Resource Standard (SRS) by 2029.

Since 2023, all non-government schools are funded at or above 20% of the SRS. Schools funded above 20% of their SRS will continue to transition down to 20% by 2029.

New schools will be funded at 100% of their SRS (80% from the Commonwealth and 20% from the NSW Government).

2024 SRS Entitlement Funding

Schools are funded under a single system, with payments by the NSW and Commonwealth Governments made according to the SRS.

The Commonwealth determines a school's SRS and changes made by the Commonwealth to a school's SRS would flow on through to NSW SRS funding.

The Commonwealth has recently published schools' 2024 capacity to contribute (CTC) scores, which are used in calculation of the SRS. Further information is available on the Commonwealth's Department of Education website.

Payment Schedule

Schools will receive NSW SRS Entitlement funding as per the following schedule:

Transition support

In 2024, the NSW Government will continue to provide transition support to help eligible schools through the Special Fund.*

Special Fund

In 2019, NSW introduced the Special Fund to support eligible special schools to adjust to the new funding arrangements over four years (2019-2022). This fund supports eligible schools based on their indexed 2018 funding.

From 2023, this additional support is transitioning down as all non-government schools are now funded at or above 100% of the SRS.
