The advisory group is formed to work with the department to co-design an Aboriginal ECEC strategy. A key objective of the group is to ensure Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices are heard in the decision making for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and communities in early education.	The First Steps Strategy is co-designed by the department in collaboration with the Aboriginal ECE Advisory Group. The 5-year strategy outlines the department's commitment to ensuring the best educational outcomes for Aboriginal children aged 0 to 5. Developing a cultural safety framework for the NSW ECEC sector is a critical component of the First Steps Strategy.	Preliminary work begins on the framework project, the <u>Aboriginal Cultural</u> <u>Safety Framework</u> for Early Childhood <u>Education (ECE)</u> , which is the first of its kind in the early childhood space in Australia.	After being chosen to deliver phase 1 of the framework project, SNAICC undertook consultations with Aboriginal communities, the ECEC sector, NSW Regulatory Authority staff and other stakeholders in July and August 2022. The consultations informed Phase 2–Co-design of the framework.
