Article One:

This article details Mayfield OSHC's (QLD) action research project which explored the research question:

• How can we be more intentional about maintaining an educator culture where school community engagement is valued and upheld?

The core focus of this research project was educator culture and how a sustainable culture that values community engagement and collaboration can be built in a OSHC service. The authors recognised that with changes in the educative team there was a need to reflect deeply about our culture and service expectations.

While this article is predominately about community engagement, the foundational steps taken relate to partnerships with stakeholders and supervision.
