Guidance for adequate supervision during transportation. By The Australian Children's Education & Care Quality Authority (ACECQA).

This article provides advice for centre-based providers and services around adequate supervision and risk assessment as it relates to transportation provided or arranged by the service, including the application of educator to child ratios. This includes factors that may influence an approved provider or nominated supervisor's decision on how many educators and/ or responsible adults are required for transportation. Guidance is also provided as to how to factor the driver into supervision requirements and the roles of responsible adults in providing adequate supervision along with educators.
