Retained Firefighter Fire & Rescue NSW

Firefighters play a vital role in making Australia a safer place to live. You'll use your understanding of human nature and commitment to others to respond to emergency incidents; and contribute to risk management activities to prevent and minimise the impact of incidents on lives, property and the environment.

What Retained Firefighters do

Retained firefighter for fire and Rescue enhance community safety, quality of life, and confidence by minimising the impact of hazards and emergency incidents on the people, property, environment and on the economy of NSW.

FRNSW firefighters are among the most highly trained in the world. Our teams provide fire prevention, they respond to hazardous materials incidents, natural disasters and medical emergencies. Our teams also undertake counter terrorism and urban search and rescue operations. We are prepared for anything – helping anyone, anywhere, anytime.

Will I get a job?

What will I earn?

\$33.34 per hour plus retainer (before tax, excluding super).

- Retained Firefighters operate in dangerous, time critical situations where lives, property & the environment may be at risk
- Firefighting can be physically and psychologically demanding, especially during protracted incident.

A day in the life...

Work as a retained firefighter may involve these tasks:

- attend fire and other emergency incidents providing expert knowledge and assistance commensurate with rank
- respond to emergency incidents in accordance with protocols, orders, legislation and training
- contribute to the Station's operational readiness; including the maintenance of appliances and equipment
- contribute to the Station's planning and prevention activities to mitigate risks
- support community safety and engagement; carrying out inspections, presenting and providing safety advice
- assist with investigations into the cause of fires
- undertake station duties including the completion of records, reports, correspondence and returns to facilitate the general running of the station
- the Retained Firefighter adheres to legislation, directions, rules, policies, protocols and standards.

VET qualifications

Live within reasonable distance (as determined by FRNSW) to the Station to enable timely response to incidents.
