A quick glance at the table of contents will show how greatly **Scan** has expanded and diversified since the first issue early in 1982. This is a reflection not simply of Library Services policy but of the value accorded **Scan** by people in schools, both government and independent, by other sections of the Department, by writers, by publishers - by all those concerned to bring people and ideas together.

This issue's lift-out is under the name of Health Studies K-12 - the formally adopted title for this curriculum strand - and was prepared and edited by Pamela Lloyd with other members of the Health Studies Curriculum Project Team.

Pamela is also responsible for the article on Mimosa Public School's balloon event, one school's dramatic and unusual technique for stimulating appreciation of Australian children's literature which went way beyond initial expectations.

Lorraine Wilson's letter, reprinted under A Writer Speaks, focuses on the converse approach; what she clearly regards as counterproductive efforts by librarians - and parents - to 'foster' literature appreciation in children.

This time, we have not only our usual range of recently published fiction and nonfiction resources, but also a small, carefully chosen selection of 1982 titles which arrived at Library Services late in 1983 and which the distributors assure us are still available. Descriptions of recently published fiction and nonfiction reprints, both in hard cover and paperback formats also occupy a large section of this issue, while comments on series take much of the space in Clippings.

Finally, the Materials Assessment Unit is delighted to welcome Ann Beedell to its group of reviewers. Ann comes to us on a 1984 deployment from Ashfield Boys High School and will be reviewing general secondary material although she admits to a special interest in Australian history.



Complete with table of contents, index and glossary, this librarybound book traces the development of the first mammals. Confined to the American continent, the contents include paleontologists searching for fossils, horses yesterday and today, early elephants, big cats, armadillos, sloths and other ancient giants. Prolific illustrations, particularly the outstanding photographs, many of which feature children observing field or museum exhibits, make this an attractive book. Small diagrams give the relative scale of humans to the animals. Despite the wide appeal of the illustrations, the lack of simple captions and the language and layout of the text limit the full use of the book to older readers. A folder containing duplicating masters of related activities taken from the Far out fun leaflet may be used without the book. An open letter from Lorraine Wilson, author of the series City Kids, Country Kids and Footy Kids.

WRITER SPEAKS

I quess that you know that City Kids, Country Kids and Footy Kids are banned by some librarians, those proud upholders of public standards. The reason generally given is that the language and the content are not considered to be of sufficiently high quality. I mean to say, fancy writing about a dead cow! Not only that but telling of the leg pulling away from the body in the process of towing the cow out of smelling range! As distasteful as this is to some city-born folk, the death, decay and disposal of dead animals is a fact of life in the country.

.... And The outdoor TOILET! Fancy writing a book about that! Believe me, the outdoor toilet occupied a lot of my time as a country child. The times I most remember are not those spent in actual occupancy but the hours beforehand, those dreaded night hours when all was dark, knowing I had to go, but trying to postpone the inevitable. Interestingly, the children of the old inner suburban areas and the outer western suburbs, who have outdoor toilets, are loving that particular Country Kids title. One of my colleagues at the College had taken me to task over And the teacher got mad, a City Kids title that his eight-year-old kid borrowed for himself. Not only was his child capable of reading books of higher standard, but that topic was not relevant to children living in the outer suburbs, said my colleague. (Note that the child selected the book for himself). More specifically, my colleague was concerned by the misuse of the word 'mad'.

Only this week I learned how a rather middle-class school is endeavouring to wean the pupils there away from the Kids titles by implementing a new library borrowing rule: a child may now borrow a Kids book only if he or she takes a 'better quality' library book at the same time. I guess as a strategy that may get some of the 'Book of the Year' awards off the shelves.

I think what worries me is not just the censorship, but the basis for it. It would appear that the argument against the Kids books is a class one. Let's not admit that some homes have outdoor toilets. (let's not mention the word 'toilet'); that some homes are small and crowded; that Dad drinks from a tinnie and goes up to school to tell the teacher off; that some of our schools are less than beautiful and

that children struggle to exclude the flies as they eat their lunch. The argument criticizing the language derives from the same source. I mean to say, what educated person uses the word 'kids'.

As far as I am concerned, the Kids titles are about real children and I believe that explains their tremendous popularity with children. All titles are thoroughly researched with children. The raw data is collected from children. The stories in draft form are trialled many times with a wide sample of children.

Children can find themselves in the books. They very readily identify with particular characters and particular situations.

And isn't that one of the great characteristics of literature? Don't we all look for ourselves in books? Don't we learn more about ourselves by identifying with book characters and contemplating our own reactions in the same situations?

Referring back to the school I mentioned earlier, the school which is intervening in the children's borrowing by permitting a loan of a Kids title, only if a 'worthwhile' book is borrowed as well. What is that practice doing to the children's attitudes to borrowing? What is that practice doing to a child's sense of control over his/her book reading program? Do the teachers even try to see the world through the eyes of the child?

If we want children to love reading, to be book-worms, they must have control over what they borrow. The time for influencing their choice is not at the loans desk but in the daily reading-aloud program. It is here that teachers should be introducing books by different authors and in different styles of writing to the children.

City Kids, Country Kids and Footy Kids can never be the only item in a child's book diet, but at any one time they may be a very staple ingredient.

- . using computers for learning
- . using computers for management.

Priority is to be given in that order within schools, and particular emphasis is to be put on the computer awareness of students in Years 7-9.

Teachers in all curriculum areas have already been considering the impact of computers on students, teachers, subjects and school life generally. One result of this activity is a recent publication Computers in English teaching: a discussion paper. Four aspects are looked at: What's the problem? Why should I get involved? Although his work covered other genres of painting, William Fletcher, a local Sydney artist, was perhaps bestknown at the time of his early death in 1983 for his arrangements of Australian wildflowers. This survey of his life and work, which includes many illustrations in superb full colour, a list of the species in the flower paintings (identified by officers of the National Herbarium) and a catalogue of the artist's known output, also reveals an undersong: that of an unusual man - a shy, reclusive artist whose memory is lovingly cherished by his friends. The precise yet graceful detail and strong, evocative placement of his wildflower arrangements (as compared to Ellis Rowan for example) make this a particularly beautiful means by which native flora can be identified and appreciated. Mimosa Public School Lets The Balloon Go!

A suburban Sydney primary school, participating in Australian Book Week 1983 which is sponsored by the National Book Council, discovered that the effects of its activities in October continued to reverberate through school and community life in ways unforseen at the time.

Mimosa Public School 'took flight' with ideas growing from the simple question 'What is your favourite Australian book?'. A huge display of books of Australian fiction, poetry, Aboriginal myths and picture books stimulated reading and discussion sessions as students determined their favourites. Eagerness and enthusiasm to read was such that demand soon outstripped the school library's capacity and books had to be borrowed from the library of a neighbouring school to satisfy readers!

With the discovery of the wealth of Australian books came the desire to share the pleasure, and so:

> 'We decided to launch the titles of our favourite books into space: to allow the four winds to carry balloons, each bearing the title of a book, as far as the fates would allow. 1

Pupils would attach tags, stating their name, class, the title of their favourite Australian book and a request that the finder return the tag with the location found, to each of 2,000 balloons, ready for a spectacular, simultaneous launch.

With this grand finale in mind, pupils and teachers set about creating displays illustrating their favourite Australian books, inviting parents and school neighbours to the great balloon launch and filling classrooms with balloon


designs and favourite Australian book covers. Incorporating an 'adoption scheme' into the school's daily organization. Year 6 pupils visited a Year 1 classroom to share in their preparations; older children read Australian stories to younger children in classrooms and library, and team efforts produced some stunning murals and three-dimensional displays.

A box of 35 picture books circulated constantly through the infants classes, and additional Australian books were on loan to a mother, a group of talented readers and even an ex-pupil.



With awareness of and enthusiasm for favourite Australian books running high, the day of the great balloon launch started at 6.45 a.m. as a team of parents began inflating the balloons. Over 60 different families assisted in producing and delivering 2,000 helium-filled balloons to 750 eager pupils waiting in classrooms. Pupils tagged their balloons with the name of their favourite Australian book and then work proceeded on through the morning. The only observable differences to a regular working classroom were the masses of tagged balloons jostling restlessly against the ceiling, their long strings dangling down to reachable height; or balloons blooming like vast exotic blossoms, tidily bunched together by a doorway, awaiting the release signal; or the maths or language work sheets worked at so busily at every desk, all in balloon form.

At 12.15 p.m., under a high, cold, brilliantly blue sky, the whole school assembled, each pupil firmly clutching his or her balloon string. A fierce, gusting south-westerly made it difficult but all the students did their best to await the signal.




Nearby schools had rearranged their lunch hours to allow pupils to watch for balloons filling the sky. Three to four hundred adults came to share the fun and the spectacle, and at the signal from principal, Doug Blunden, the balloons soared skywards — and the school band played, and everyone sang 'Up, Up and Away'.

However the excitement hadn't ended. Over the next weeks, tags were returned and individual pupils discovered that their balloons had travelled out to sea and back inland again, coming down as far afield as

Laurieton - one was found by a farmer while mowing a paddock on his property near Forster!

As librarian Crys Mills and Deputy Principal, Infants Pam Guy say, the real value of the fun and excitement lay in the involvement of the whole school community with the project; in the increase in knowledge of Australian books and authors by teachers, pupils and parents; in the mutual support explored and enjoyed by pupils of all ages; in the observable increase in the borrowing of Australian books and in the continuation of that interest.

Teachers and parents were additionally gratified and excited to discover at the beginning of 1984 that Mimosa had won the first prize for primary schools in both the national display competition and the poster competition organized by



the National Book Council for Australian Book Week 1983. Pupils were proud of the prizes their efforts had brought to their school, but for them the real excitement came on the 10th February, 1984 when a Year 1 pupil's tag was returned all the way from Nelson Bay ... his favourite book was Who sank the boat. For the pupils of Mimosa Primary School, their balloons are still flying! P. L.

READ BEFORE YOU BUY

BRECHNER, Irv The easy to understand computer dictionary. WIDL Video, 1983

Since cashing—in on the interest in computers has become a favourite sport, it's as well to be wary when buying books which purport to be designed for the novice who may not always be able to judge the quality of the information they contain. Yet another 'easy to understand' introductory dictionary, this book gives some fairly patchy definitions of computer terms, supported by illustrations which in some cases convey useless or wrong effects. For example, the drawing accompanying the explanation for 'hard disk' shows a disk being hit with a hammer and the definition for 'silicon', which is explained as the main ingredient in sand, shows a beach scene with a man supposedly making silicon chips from sand in a bucket. Although supposedly a 'dictionary', the definitions are not organised into alphabetical order.

As part of a four-part series entitled Choosing a home this sound/slide set is most likely to be considered relevant to school curricula. However it has some serious deficiencies. Whilst it raises many issues related to finding rental accommodation, the cost of living away from home and personal relationships when sharing, the set does not cover these adequately and there is a serious factual error regarding bond monies. The set attempts too much: it glosses over some of the practical difficulties that can arise when sharing accommodation, it could be considered to be sexist, and it does not present any alternatives to rental accommodation for teenagers leaving home.
