Article types

Scan publishes a combination of:

- standard articles
- peer reviewed research articles please refer to the separate <u>Research</u> quidelines)
- SPaRK articles (Shared Practice and Resource Kits) please see page 2.

Criteria

Articles must:

- have a K-6, 7-12 or K-12 curriculum focus OR
- offer professional learning relevant to teacher needs OR
- cover topics appropriate to teacher librarians

AND

- include ideas or activities for implementation
- be referenced adequately (if appropriate).

Editorial process

Articles submitted to Scan are:

- 1. submitted to the Scan Editor
- 2. read to ensure their focus meets the journal's criteria
- 3. edited and formatted to suit the journal's environment.



Format

- · Please provide your article in Word format.
- Images or graphics used within the article should also be provided as separate files – JPG (photos) or PNG (infographics).
- For accessibility reasons, please do not use tables.
- Scan encourages use of embedded objects or video or other multimedia. (If creating your own videos, please include captions to aid accessibility.)
- Minimum of 500 words OR a video presentation.
- Scan uses APA referencing. If possible, please use this format.
- Please provide a portrait photo of yourself (separate JPG file) and a short bio (60-80 words).

Publication deadlines

New issues of the journal are published each term. Submissions are generally due about 8 weeks prior to publication (longer for research articles). Please contact the editorial team about specific deadlines: Editor.Scan@det.nsw.edu.au.

SPaRK articles

A Shared Practice and Resource Kit (SPaRK) is a practical article based on a resource (book, website, app or other learning resource). The resource is used as the catalyst to the learning activities.

The following headings are used in a SPaRK:

- Title and publication details or location of chosen resource
- Syllabus links what syllabus(es) and Stages/years the resource could be used for
- Resource overview a brief description or blurb of the resource
- Educational significance why this resource should be used for the curriculum identified
- Suggestions for using this resource how to introduce the resource to the students
- Teaching activities specific activities with links to additional resources and/or outcomes
- Experimenting any creative or innovative ways students can be extended or
 offered other learning as a result of the learning series.
